Pastor's Poyou believe God has a plan for you? I have always hated that question. It makes me feel

like the goal in life is to figure out what God's plan is for us and get on it. However, I do not believe in a God that predestines everything we do. Or even everything we are supposed to do. I do like to think about the question of meaning and purpose.

Another way to ask this might be, "Do you feel called in what you are doing?' Pastors are asked about their calling all the time. But, what about you? I would argue that your calling is just as important as my calling. The other thing to realize is that we all have many callings in life. We may be called to be married or single. We may be called to be parents, or coaches, or students. We are called in our work and in our play. There is meaning in all these things. My calling as a pastor is no more important than my calling as a spouse, or parent, or friend. God calls us right where we are, right now. And as the prayer goes, "God also calls us to ventures of which we cannot see the ending" (see ELW page 304). I like to say that we are called today and led into tomorrow.

Whether you feel it or not, you are called by God into a life of faith in all that you are doing. The more we get in touch with that call, the more we will find meaning and fulfillment in our lives. The Reformation was really built on two pillars. Is there a God (and what kind of God do we have)? And what is my purpose in the world? I would like us at United to help one another engage in this question in our daily lives. In Lutheran circles, this is known as the question of vocation. What is your vocation? And remember, there is not just one that claims you for your whole life.

My friend Jack and I once got into an argument at a men's retreat. He was an insurance adjuster and he got upset when I suggested that his calling was just as important as mine. His argument was that it was a lot easier to see my connection with God than in the work he did. It is much easier to serve God in my role than his role. I think the opposite is true. I am often preaching to the choir. People expect me to act in a certain way. People will be more surprised by you when they come to understand that you do what you do because of your relationship with God.

I remember hearing the story of someone in my hometown, upon hearing that they had a calling from God, express that this was much too noble of an idea. "Callings from God are for pastors" is often the thought. I wonder if that is the reason that when pastors fail in their moral actions, their calling comes into question. As a pastor, I am to strive to lead a Godly life. But as a baptized child of God, so are you. Our calling is not to be perfect, but to be about the forgiveness of sins in all that we do.

Luther put it this way, "So vocation belongs to this world, not to heaven; it is directed toward one's neighbor, not toward God.,.. In their vocation one is not reaching up to God, but rather bends oneself down toward the world. When one does that, God's creative work is carried on. God's work of love takes



form on earth, and that which is external witnesses to God's love. If we note properly how much good

God bestows upon us, both through His direct creation and through all His created orders, we shall know the truth that He forgives sins. "God has shown the forgiveness of sins in all His creation."



Lent is around the corner. Have you been about the forgiveness of sins lately?



Earthkeepers February 2021

Every year most of us may make some of the


same resolutions: exercise more, read more, watch less TV, lose weight, get in touch with old friends, do daily devotions, etc. Now, a month in to the new year, perhaps some of those resolutions, have been kept, some, as Pastor Dodd used to say, "not so much".

Now we might pay serious attention to THINK BIG, or outside the box to resolutions which will affect the larger world. Think about using Governor Brown's Carbon Policy plan to "swap out" the state's existing automobile fleet with zer-emissions vehicles and add charging stations at public buildings. At the same time, the Dept. Of Transportation is required to conduct a statewide analysis of what infrastructure the state needs to expand use of electric vehicles, and begin evaluating the greenhouse impacts of transportation projects as part of its planning.

Happily, one of the "benefits" of this epidemic has been a noticeable decrease in air pollution. Can we continue the pattern once the epidemic is past?

Included in her plan is to further ratchet down the carbon intensity of gasoline and provisions for updated energy efficiency standards for appliances and directives for reducing food waste. In total, the action impacts 19 state agencies and commissions, directing a large portion of the state's bureaucracy to do its work toward reducing emissions. That sweeping nature is certain to make it a target - both legally and rhetorically - of Republicans and industry groups.

If you approve of Governor Brown's Carbon Policy - (did I mentions in New Year resolutions "Get in touch with your legislators"?) Now is the time to make your position known. I believe in "speaking my piece" when I feel strongly about an issue. And I believe you CAN make a difference.
